No Duma discussion for Sunrise

Request to review barred trustee issue a non starter for school division

A request from Springfield council to meet with Sunrise School Division trustees to discuss recent actions taken by the board against Oakbank (Ward 4) Trustee Diane Duma is apparently not an ontion.

Duma is apparently not an option.

The school division is happy to meet with the RM of Springfield on any number of tepics, just not this one, board chair Don Nichol stated in a letter to Mayor Tiffany Fell dated June 5.

"We appreciate your desire to work together with the school division and to collaboratively address the mutual business interests of our respective organizations," Nichol wrote. "That said, the enforcement of the Sunrise Code of Conduct and any ensuing disciplinary actions in accordance with the Public Schools Act are not the mandate of the municipality. As such, the board will not be party at a meeting at which this is the topic of discussion."

This past spring, Sunrise trustees voted

unanimously to impose sanctions on Duma, barring her from meetings until May 11 and subcommittees until June 30. Part of the resolution identified that the board requested Duma agree to certain parameters presented to her in an action plan not released to the public.

released to the public.

Duma failed to agree to Sunrise's action plan and was banned from all meetings until May 22. After once again failing to sign that plan, she was banned until July 11. During the period of her suspension, Duma was also ordered to not have communication with division staff.

While Duma has publicly stated she has no idea why these actions have been taken against her, sources say they are in connection with an ongoing 'respectful workplace complaint' against the trustee from last year where she was accused of allegedly bullying a member of the Sunrise administration.

At a board meeting in October 2018, trustees voted to accept the findings of an investigation into the incident. A second motion requesting Duma provide a written apology to the complainant and "commit to cease and desist with any hamful or harassine behaviour" was also nassed

ing behaviour" was also passed.

The board sought guidance from the Department of Education, the Manitoba School Board Association (MSBA) and the division's lawyer before bringing any action forward.

action forward.

At their May 7 council meeting, the RM of Springfield unanimously voted to invite the Sunrise board to a meeting to share the rationale behind the decision to penalize Duma. The ensuing discussion saw several councillors use very direct language in their criticism of the board's decision. The meeting ended with Fell stating the RM 'should write a letter to the school board directing them to deal with any issues they have in a way that doesn't take away representation from children."

A subsequent letter from Fell to Sunrise dated May 21 stated that as Springfield is the largest contributor to the tax base of the division, "council is concerned that a board member, elected by the residents of Springfeld, is not being allowed to participate in decisions involving use of public funds."

"The board's actions have effectively eliminated board representation for a large number of residents in Springfield by not allowing Trustee Duma to provide community leadership and accountability to her constituents," the letter continued.

While the letter states Duma was "elected," she and fellow Ward 4 Trustee Karen Insley were acclaimed as they ran unopposed in the last election. Oakbank is also the only ward with two Sunrise trustees, meaning citizens from Oakbank still have representation in Insley.

Springfield is also represented by Dugald (Ward 3) Trustee Dianne Roeland and Anola (Ward 2) Trustee Robin Harris, who was appointed by the division to represent Anola and Hazelridge after nobody ran for the seat in the last election. Harris lives in the RM of Brokenhead.

In total, four of the nine school board

positions are held by Springfield representatives. No other municipality in Sunrise has more representation.

Size of contribution to the tax base does taxtor into the number of trustees allosted to any municipality. According to Sec 57(2) of The Public Schools Act, "Subject as Icrein provided each trustee of a school division or school district divided into wards shall represent, in so far as is practicable, approximately the same number of resident voters."

Springfield is not giving up however. At their June 18 meeting, council unanimously voted to send a letter to Sunrise requesting a review of its current ward boundaries. That letter was not drafted as of press time.

Extra pathways under review for Oakbank

Oakbank pedestrians should soon have some extra pathways to walk on, but how many are yet to be determined, council decided at its June 11 meeting.

Included in this year's municipal budget, the Springfield Pathway will extend south of Springfield Road on the east side, allowing people to safely walk to the Co-op grocery store and nearby shops. The asphalt path will be eight feet wide.

That is as far as the path should stretch for now, director of engineering and environmental services Santokh Randhawa said.

"Once the property south of Sunova is developed at that time it may be incorporated. But still I feel there will not be too much usage of this path at this time," Randhawa said.

One councillor disagreed.

"I'm not in favour of the way you have

it drawn out," Coun. Glen Fuhl replied.
"My concern is a pathway is to be used and I don't see the purpose of it being used as much going there versus to the RM office."

Whatever work does get completed will be covered by a portion of Gas Tax proceeds Springfield is to receive this year, Randhawa said.

Fuhl suggested approaching the Red River North Trails Association for funding, which if received, would allow the municinality to my the nath

pality to run the path.

There are additional factors at play. Some members of the public wish to see the path extend to the Springfield Public Library in Dugald, which would necessitate crossing PR 206 at some point. Others wish to see the paths extend elsewhere, so administration has been tasked with identifying the highest priorities and suggesting how they could link together. That work is ongoing, Mayor Tiffany Fell said.

Solving water woes together

>> Regional Drainage Committee's team approach among municipalities is making a difference

It's been 2 1/2 years since the Regional Drainage Committee (RDC) was formed and the team approach to solving water woes is making a differ-

The brainchild of Wallace-Woodworth Councillor Val Caldwell, the RDC encourages partnering municipalities to look both ways - upstream and downstream - when dealing with water flow issues.

"Water is everyone's issue," said Caldwell, "It's about a new way of thinking and considering what water does downstream, not just within municipal borders.

Representatives from the four partnering municipalities Hamiota, Riverdale, Wallace Woodworth, and Yellowhead recently toured the area along with Ryan Canart and Colleen Cuvelier of the Upper Assini-boine River and Little Saskatchewan River Conservation

"It really helps when you can physically see where the water flows," said Caldwell. Hamiota CAO Tristan Ur-

quhart agrees.

"Seeing each other's trou-ble spots definitely has an impact. The more info you have, the better equipped you are to make a decision," he said, adding that the local conservation districts have been instrumen-tal. "They have a larger view of the water systems.

The 'sandwich' municipal-ity of the group, Hamiota's main goal is to keep the water flowing from Yellowhead in north to Wallace-Woodworth and Riverdale to the south, in such a way that it minimizes the impact both at home and further down-stream, and helps alleviate problems upstream.

"We don't have any large body of water and because our terrain is pretty flat, water spreads out and then gets landlocked and it's hard to get rid

of," said Urquhart.

To help address the issue,
the Hamiota Municipality is considering replacing some ex-isting culverts with 'D' pipes, which have a flatter bottom than traditional culverts.

"This allows water to start flowing earlier so that it doesn't build up and then surge," said Urquhart. This neighbourly approach

of taking into consideration the impact of water flow throughout the region is exactly what Caldwell was hoping for.
"If we can work together as

community leaders, hopefully we can spur community mem-bers to consider how they are impacting their neighbours, she said.

Perhaps the biggest gain made by the RDC is the improved communication be-tween public works employees of all four municipalities.

"They are the boots on the ground," said Urquhart. "They are the ones putting in culverts and taking out culverts. For them to be able to talk to each other and communicate where trouble spots are lets them get ready by preparing their trouble spots before the

This can be as simple as working together to make sure there is space for water downstream before clearing cul-verts. And it also involves a proactive approach of working with conservation districts and local landowners to create retention projects that will slow the flow of water during

peak events.
It might not seem like a major concern this year, given the dry conditions, but high water episodes will occur again, and it makes sense to be prepared, said Urquhart.

"These are the years we can do projects. When the water is low, you can get to see things and work on them, rather than when these areas are under water."

Caldwell agrees and says the RDC is working with the local conservation districts to put in a proposal to the prov-ince for the implementation of retention and diversion pro-

jects.
"Water knows where it wants to go," said Caldwell, adding that it makes sense to work together to keep water moving in a manner that does the least harm all along the way. "When we pull the rope in the same direction, we can

REGULATIONS PERTAINING TO SWIMMING POOLS

The City of Dauphin would like to advise residents of the regulations pertaining to new or previously existing outdoor swimming pools on residential properties. In accordance with the Manitoba Building Code and the City of Dauphin Zoning Bylaw 04/2015, a swimming pool that exceeds two feet in depth requires the following:

- A permit from the City of Dauphin to be obtained prior to the installation and setup;
- A permanent protective fence enclosure no shorter than 1.5 m (5 ft.) in height;
- A self-closing gate equipped with a lockable latch to prevent unauthorized entry;
- An inspection by the Building inspector after completion of installation of the pool and required enclosure but prior to filling of the pool.



drives along the road and sprays weeds we need to get rid of."

In addition to the RM of Bifrost-Riverton, the RMs of Armstrong, Pipestone, Wallace-Woodworth (Virden) have the Romafa weed arm, and Selkirk has ordered one.

The odd thing about the area's machine shops is that they don't compete against one another. They specialize in different lines and help make parts for one other, which in turns bolsters their businesses and allows them to create employment.

"Ninety-nine per cent of our product is agricultural-related. Diemo has a lot of agricultural products as well, but we're not competing with them. We're working together. In fact, if it wasn't for the bigger shops, small guys like us would have a very hard time," said Kornelsen.

"It allowed us a much lower start-up cost because we can go to the neighbours and they will cut steel for us and they will bend it for us, and we'll do all the welding assembly and marketing. We don't have to have millions of dollars to get started. As a community we have great benefits working together like that."

Another boon to Kornelsen's business will be the complete re-building and paving of PR 326, which runs right outside Romafa's door. The province has committed to upgrading 19.7 kilometres of highway to help the machine shops and ag producers cope with dust and transportation-related costs.

The highway, which has weight restrictions imposed in the spring, can be hazardous to trucking companies and couriers who pick up and deliver parts and products on a daily basis.

parts and products on a daily basis.

"The upgrading will make a huge difference, and in many ways, it will make this community much more productive," said Kornelsen as he and his wife treated employees and guests to birthday cake and coffee in the company's kitchen.

With his willingness to tackle whatever problem individuals and big companies throw at him, Kornelsen said he's seen his business do exceptionally well. And despite not having spent very much on advertising, word-of-mouth has brought "significant" companies to his door.

"I had the vision to serve the community and be a man that could repair and fix their problems, and that's how we got into this," said Kornelsen. "And I'm confident to say that it is the good Lord that showers [this success] down upon us."

Cabin burns to cinders



Monitoring, landfill plan authorized

Further work on the Creighton landfill is scheduled to take place, thanks to a new measure approved by Creighton town council dur

ing their June 12 meeting.
On-site ground monitoring and the creation of a corrective action plan for the landfill were approved by council, which voted to authorize town chief administrative officer Paula Muench to sign a proposal from Associated Engineering for the work. In total, the project will cost the town \$12,900.

"They are testing the wa-ter and all the wells. There are four sites at the landfill and they're testing the water in all four sites. It's something that Saskatchewan Environment has asked us to do," said Cindy Davis, assistant administrator for the town of Creighton.

Zoning bylaw

The final draft of a new

version of the town's zoning bylaws was reviewed by councillors. A motion to approve the bylaws was not raised or passed, but discussion about the changes in the new bylaws did take place. It would be the first time since 2012 that Creighton's zoning bylaws have seen a large-scale update.

"There was a lot of things in there that the building inspector had asked to be changed.

It had been a long time since it had been discussed or brought up, so there's stuff that didn't apply anymore," said Davis.

A copy of the new draft zoning bylaws was not provided to the public, but Davis was clear that the changes are vast and involve cleaning up a number of loose ends in the

"It's 126 pages," she said.
"Some of the different zoning areas, there was industrial sites zoned in residential areas. Some of that was changed. Some of the distances of how far away you have to be from lot lines for building, discretionary uses, permitted uses, dif-ferent things like that."

Creighton councils next scheduled meeting was moved one day earlier from June 26 to June 25. A double hooking with New North, which is set to hold its annual general meeting June 27 in Prince Albert,

caused the rescheduling. New North is a regional association of northern Saskatchewan councils and groups, of which the town of Creighton is a member. Mayor Bruce Fidler. who serves as New North's chair, was absent from

Creighton's latest council meeting - in person, at current bylaws. least. Fidler joined council via phone for the meeting.

Once the council got to new business, Fidler provided council members with a report on where he was on a tour of northern municipalities, organized by New North.

"I've had a really in-teresting tour the last few days. I've been to a lot of different communities and sat in on a number of different council meetings. Once I'm back, maybe at that Tuesday [June 25] meeting, I'll give a quick report on things that I've seen and learned, It's been good," said Fidler.

Thirteen new paramedic jobs will be opened within the Northern Health Region (NHR) later this year, but it is unclear whether any of the jobs will be based in Flin Flon.

The new positions were first announced during this year's provincial budget, which was released in March. The jobs within the

NHR are likely to be posted this fall.

While the future paramedics will work within NHR territory and fa-cilities, the workers will operate under the purview of Shared Health, the province-wide entity that oversees some health and business functions for Manitoba health care. When asked in what locations the paramed-

"Careful planning is underway to ensure these positions are appropriately allocated to Shared Health EMS stations in efforts to address existing health system pressures?

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

AMC disappointed on the passing of Bill C-92

In solidarity with the Chiefs of Ontario, the Assembly of Manitoba Chiefs (AMC) is disappointed to see this legislation passed without the inclusion of key amendments that would have responded to the unique circumstances and First Nation-specific rights of First Nations children.

AMC Grand Chief Arlen Dumas stated: "Despite Canada's commitment to support First Nation-specific child welfare legislation in Manitoba, through an MOU negotiated in good faith with the AMC First Nations, the federal government now denies the force of the MOU."

The MOU, signed in 2017, provided funding to the AMC to engage with First Nations in Manitoba to develop their own legislation in relation to First Nations children in care that was specific to the rights, interests and circumstances of First Nations children in Manitoba. AMC First Nations, led by the AMC Women's Council and the AMC First Nations Family Advocate Office, developed the Bringing Our Children Home Act. AMC First Nations were shocked to hear of the Assembly of First Nations support for pan-Indigenous federal legislation that did not provide guaranteed funding or sufficient protections for our children from apprehensions and abuse in foster care.

During the Senate and House studies of the AFN-supported Bill C-92, the AMC advanced significant concerns about the Bill and requested substantive amendments. None of the amendments were adopted.

"We agree with the sentiments expressed by the Chiefs of Ontario, and other First Nation leaders and child welfare experts about the significant flaws with this bill that may well make things worse for First Nation children, families and communities. Without the statutory guarantee of funding, the government has set it up to fail. Without any funding commitment from the federal government for First Nations to develop their laws and policies, engage in critical training and education, and develop or improve the infrastructure and supports, the Province will be able to continue to tear our families apart. It is provincial laws, policies and practices that have created this humanitarian crisis in Manitoba. It is just one of the reasons why there are close to 9,000 First Nations children in the CFS system. The National Inquiry into Murdered and Missing Indigenous Women and Girls has identified the over-representation of our children in foster care as a modern form of genocide. Canada should have listened to First Nations and amended or withdrawn this bill," said Grand Chief Dumas.


"Regardless of this legislative development, First Nations in Manitoba will continue to assert their jurisdiction in the area of children and families. Bill C-92 and the Province of Manitoba cannot stop that," concluded Grand Chief Dumas.

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



There are now over 40 cases this year, as of June 24, according to Manitoba Pork, The latest available number from the province was 36 cases, as of June 18

Manitoba saw a relative lull last year in PEDv following the 2017 outbreak. Only 16 cases were confirmed in 2018.

WHY IT MATTERS

Before 2017, Manitoba saw five or fewer cases of porcine epidemic diarrhea virus (PEDv), a disease that can kill 80 to 100 per cent of piglets less than a week old. Two years ago, those annual cases jumped to 80, and this year might be shaping up much the same.

Anxiety has risen with news that the virus has crossed west of the Red River. Four cases had been reported in south-central Manitoba as of June 21. Two cases were also confirmed

west of the Red River in 2017 both were later linked to direct animal movement from an infected barn in the east. Western cases this year did not have such a link, a fact that the Manitoba Pork Council has noted with


concern.
"It leads us to question how it would have got there," said Jenelle Hamblin, Manitoba Pork Council manager of swine health programs. "This virus is quite clusive and we haven't been able to pinpoint a lot as to

how it's moving." Producers did try and reduce day-to-day transport follow-ing the 2017 outbreak, she said, although that risk is difficult to eliminate, since the pork pro-duction system requires regular

movement.
Residual immunity has somewhat buffered piglet loss com-pared to 2017, Duizer said, although losses in naive barns have been severe. About 60 per cent of infected barns this year were previously infected, the

province reports.
"It is by no means protective for the entire herd," he said. "But it does seem to limit the impact a certain degree, and that obviously wanes over time. The prob-lem with the residual immunity is that it's not preventive of the disease, it just seems to limit the impact, especially in some of the

Reinfection is not necessarily a sign of biosecurity gaps, he add-ed. Manure from 2017 remains a possible chink in a barn's de-

factors.

fence, even after the virus has disappeared from the herd. The province estimates that residual risk from manure might last at least two years, although the ex-act window is unknown.

"There certainly could be risk factors that they maybe didn't fully address last time around, but in many cases you're also looking at larger farms in swine-dense areas and those in them-selves are risk factors," he said.

Both HyLife Foods and Maple Leaf Foods are currently battling the virus.

Eight HyLife Foods barns

had tested positive for PEDv as of June 19, company founder Claude Vielfaure said

"Since (the) first PED showed up in Manitoba a few years ago, we've obviously looked very, very closely to our biosecurity controls and tried to improve them over the years and this virus is a bit of a mystery on how it spreads," he said. "It's a tough

The company is looking for further improvements and extra biosecurity measures, he said.

The company has acquired additional hogs from other barns in Manitoba and Saskatchewan due to potential loss.

Maple Leaf Foods did not re-

veal how many of its barns were infected, but did confirm the virus's presence in its facilities.

rus's presence in its facilities.

"All major systems and some independent farms have had cases of the virus including Maple Leaf Foods," the company said over email. "All producers in Manitoba are following stringent biosecurity protocols. However, weather and windy conditions driving aerosol spread via dust is definitely a factor in this year's PEDv cases."

Long shadow of 2017

The CVO believes this year's outbreak is still spillover from 2017, rather than a new source of infection from out of provof infection from out of prov-ince, Duizer said. Hamblin pointed to sequencing work being done to verify current PEDv strains and confirm where the continued infections are coming from.

Veterinarians and the sector as a whole hope to get a better idea of how risk factors from 2017 might come into play today, she said, including things like area spread, manure application, and how far the virus might move

Manitoba Pork pushing online disease response program as PEDv cases climb

Participation in the Manitoba Co-ordinated Disease Response program has grown to 79 per cent in the southeast

The Manitoba Pork Council is hoping to get the final few southeasthog producers signed on to the flist line of defence against

About 79 per cent of those producers have signed on with the council's Manitoba Co-ordinated Disease Response program (MCDR). The online information sharing platform includes information. tion on biosecurity, manure spreading and outbreak status, including the location of infected premises.

Producers can access the platform's information after signing a confidentiality agreement.

"They provide their information to the platform as well," the council's manager of swine health programs. Jeneile Hamblin, said. "It's definitely been a beneficial tool to quickly get disease information out to producers who are currently fighting the virus."

The program was launched in 2017 during a major outbreak. The council eventually expanded the program from the south east, the current hotbed for the virus, to the rest of the province in the hopes of improving general disease response outside of

As of June 21, about 53 per cent of all hog farmers in Manitoba were signed on with the program.

The council has seen more farmers sign on since 2019 PED.

reports began to come in, Hamblin said.
The pork council is working with herd veterinarians and

Manitoba Agriculture on disease tracking, as well as promoting biosecurity and engaging with service providers (one infection vector identified in 2017) as this year's outbreak continues.

"Each premise needs to work with its herd veterinarian, being



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

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

Forest tent caterpillars were making a heavy infestation of the boulevard trees. The City was considering what type of spray to use on them.



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

Now, he wants to supersize that mistake on a national scale, by recommistake on a hattonal state, by recom-mending that taxpayers be forced to spend billions on a government drug plan for people who already have workplace and private sector cover-age – coverage that would almost certainly be more comprehensive than the new government plan that replaced it.

Hoskins and others point out that

not everyone has a drug plan, which is true. But the obvious question is: why not focus limited taxpayer resources on helping those who need it, rather than subsidizing those who don't? Simply put, there's no need to wipe

out a system that already works well for the vast majority of Canadians in

order to help a few.
It's no secret that when governments spread themselves too thin,

they end up doing everything poorly.

More importantly, even if the government wanted to, the federal cupboard is already bear.

Not only did the Trudeau government fail to balance the budget as ment fail to duance the budget as promised in 2019, but their promised "modest deficits" totalling \$26 billion over three years ended up being \$72 billion — nearly triple the campaign commitment - with no plan to get back to balance anytime soon.

If they can't even keep a lid on their existing plans, where are they going to come up with another \$15 billion?

Finally, even if they could find the money, does anybody scriously believe \$15 billion would turn out to

be the final price tag?
From the federal gun registry to
Ontario's eHealth, and from ships for
the navy to the Phoenix payroll system, time and again governments have failed to stay within their esti-mated budgets, with taxpayers left holding the bag.

These are the people Canadians are supposed to trust to deliver a massive new social program on the best-possi-ble budget?

It's easy for politicians to make big promises. It's a lot harder to actually

pay for them.

We don't need wall-to-wall government pharmacare to address gaps in the system, and we simply can't afford it.

BRANDON - A drug treatment court to help individuals who are suffering from chronic and acute substance abuse issues is being established in the Westman area, Chief Judge Margaret Wiebe and Justice Minister Cliff Cullen announced.

"It is well recognized that people with unique challenges such as substance abuse can benefit greatly from specialized, holistic wrap-around services," said Wiebe, "Drug treatment court facilitates and supports this approach while dealing with the criminal justice matter before the court. The provincial court of Manitoba is therefore very pleased to be establishing such a court in the Westman area,

The Manitoba government is providing \$75,000 through the federal Drug Treatment Court Funding Program (DTCFP) to support the establishment of this court.

Drug treatment courts aim to break the cycle of drug use, criminal behaviour and incarceration by establishing a partnership between courts, treatment facilities and social service agencies. The goals of drug treatment courts are to reduce the number of crimes associated with addiction, reduce harm due to drug use, and provide the participant with the tools for vocation and educational success, positive mental and physical health, appropriate housing and improved family relation-

ships.
"Drug treatment courts address the root causes of crime and provide participants with the community supports they need to live productive and positive lives, while reducing costs to justice, health and social services," said Cullen. "The establishment of a drug treatment court in the Westman area supports the goals of our government's Criminal Justice System Modernization Strategy by reducing reliance on incarceration for non-violent offenders whose crimes were committed as a result of drug addiction."

The Westman drug treatment court judge will oversee the court, but will make decisions in consultation with a team of experts that will include the Crown, defence counsel, the program manager and the case manager. All drug treatment court participants must plead guilty to their charges, appear in court weekly and work closely with the Westman drug treatment court team to design an effective rehabilitation plan,

Wiebe said Westman drug treatment court will work closely with the Westman Hub Table, which brings social service professionals together to connect at-risk individuals or families with supports and services proactively, to ensure participants are

supported. Addictions therapy will be provided by the Addictions Foundation of Manitoba and comprehensive case plans will address issues such as housing education, employment, and physical and mental health

Funding for the pilot is being made available through the federal Drug Treatment Court Funding Program (DTCFP), which aims to address the underlying substanceuse disorders behind an offender's appearance in court. In 2018-19, Canada and Manitoba entered into a new five-year funding agreement which renewed the ongoing funding which Canada has been providing to Manitoba through the DTCFP.

*Drug treatment courts have been proven to be more successful at tackling the root causes of criminal behaviour than conventional criminal justice strategies," said Cullen. "By breaking the cycle of drug use, crime and incarceration, participants' lives are directly improved and the community benefits from a reduction in recidivism, unemployment and social service agency involvement."

The Westman drug treatment court is expected to begin taking referrals as of July 2 and expects to begin sitting in the fall of 2019. Wiebe said, adding information sessions will be offered to local stakeholders in the coming weeks.

No more ruffing it - Selkirk's first fenced dog park

If you feel a stronger than normal breeze coming from Selkirk Park in the near future, don't worry, it's just the additional air flow being created by the wagging of happy dog tails as they enjoy the city's first fenced off-leash dog park.

Ruth Rolfe, the city's Manager of Parks and Recreation Facilities, says the park will be open to dogs and their families in early July

The location in Selkirk Park, across the road from the campground office, is a rather fetching one and was selected for several reasons

There was consideration for other sites, such as the fields by the Recreation Complex, and other areas of Selkirk Park," Rolfe said.

"The site in Selkirk Park has the best topography, and the most suitable location for access to existing foot and road travel."

The dog park will feature two double gate entries, allowing the dog owner to open the first gate and close it behind, allowing owner and dog to stand in a waiting area while the other dogs approach and sniff out the new arrival. Once everyone is acquainted, the owner can open the second gate to enter the dog park.

"One of the main things is dogs are very social, so when a new guy comes all the other dogs run to meet it," Rolfe said.

"We didn't want to cre-

ate a situation where the dogs can get out easily."

There will be a double gate entry off the roadway and another on the other end of the dog park, off the walking trail.

The dog park will be 1.75 acres and contained within a four-foot high chain link fence. There will also be a 12-foot equipment gate so the city can maintain the area. Public washrooms are nearby in Selkirk Park.

Rolfe said there are trees and small hills within the park and there will be bags available for owners to pick up dog waste and gar-bage cans for them to dispose of the bags.

Rules will be posted in the dog park as well.

The City of Selkirk identified the establishment of a dog park as a priority in

its 2016 Recreation Strategy and allocated funds to complete the project within three years.

City of Selkirk Marketing and Communications Coordinator Vanessa Figus says the public has been fully engaged in the establishment of a dog park, and a CitizenVoice survey in October 2018 on the topic was a huge success.

We had a tremendous response to the survey and we had more people sign up for CitizenVoice at that time than any other survey," Figus said.

"We're glad the public is enthused about the dog park and also thrilled that people saw through this initiative that they can use CitizenVoice to have their say in what happens in their city."

According to the survey, more than 65 per

cent of Selkirk residents are dog owners and 85 per cent of respondents wanted an off-leash area that was fenced, with 82 per cent wanting the area to include natural features, like trees, to provide shade. The survey also indicated people would like to be able to access the dog park by walking.

The city's Strategic Plan calls for public engagement as well as development of outdoor spaces and providing the best recreational opportunities.

Rolfe said the contract to crect the fence has been awarded and work will begin this week.

She's hoping to form a community group to help operate and manage the dog park and was encouraged by the response in the survey.

"Of significance was the hours of the park."

number of people that were interested in becoming part of a dog park society or committee," Rolfe said.

"Of those who took the survey, 27 per cent were interested, which equates to 56 people. This bodes well for developing a volunteer group to monitor the park, and for fundraising and future development.

The location also allows for improvements in the future.

"One of the reasons why we chose that space is because it already has a water line and electrical, and though we won't be connecting for now, if we want to do that in the future, we could have a water feature and we could have lights on at night so we can extend the

Winnipeg teen arrested following St. Andrews home invasion

A Winnipeg teen is facing multiple charges following an early morning home invasion in the RM of St. Andrews last week.

Selkirk RCMP members responded immediately and located a male suspect leaving the scene wearing a hood tied tightly around his face. The male took off running and was apprehended a short distance away.

A 17-year-old male from Winnipeg was arrested and numerous charges are pending including Robbery with a Weapon, Breaking and Entering with Intent, Disguised with Intent to Commit an Offence, Forcible Confinement, Possession of a Weapon for Dangerous Purpose, Uttering Threats and Theft.

The homeowners, a 78-year-old male and a 77-year-old female, were treated and released on scene by paramedics.

RCMP say the investigation has determined that the suspect was involved in the theft of a vehicle in Winnipeg and drove the vehicle to the location on Norwood Road. The stolen vehicle was recovered at the resi-

RCMP Police Dog Services attended the scene and did a search which resulted in locating stolen property and the knife involved in the incident.

RCMP continue to investigate.

Manitoba Hydro is warning customers of a new type of scam phone call.

These phone calls are sophisticated, using recordings that sound like Manitoba Hydro representatives and 'spoofing" Manitoba Hydro's 1-888-624-9376 number, according a release sent out to media last Friday.

These scammers call to say your account is in arrears and requires immediate payment. They may leave a voicemail asking you to call a different number back. If you talk to them, they will pretend to look up your address and account number, and they'll try to

"arrange payment" at non-Hydro locations.

Manitoba Hydro has four phone numbers: 1-888-624-9376, 1-866-890-3856, 204-480-5900, and 204-480-5901. You should never call any other number about your Hydro account. Manitoba Hydro does not accept payments over the phone, over PayPal, using credit cards, or from wire transfers. A full list of payment options is available at hydro.mb.ca/accounts_and_ services/payment_options/.

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

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

Delegates voted to carry 14 of those resolutions to the AMMs annual convention, where they will be debated by officials from Mantonias 137 incorporated manificialities. 

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

Travel Manitoba efforts to improve tourism working

It's coming close to the end of a two year run as the Tourism Consultant for Travel Manitoba as part of the 2017 Northern Manitoba Tourism Strategy and Al McLauchlan feels it's thus far been a hir success

big success.
"I've had some really good successes and all you have to do is take a look on a Friday or any day- and sit downtown and see the vehicle going by with the boats and motors attached. It's been unbelievably successful," said McLauchlan.

McLauchlan officially took on the role on December 19th, 2017, with a two year mandate to increase tourism in the region. The province was aiming to see an increase in dollars spent on tourism in the north of over \$30 million.

Some areas have seen an increase in terms of participation, with McLauchlan stating ice fishing is perhaps the most noticeable.

"The ice fishing has just gone through the roof. You're getting people up here from all throughout southern Manitoba, southern Saskatchewan, you're getting people from the northern United States like Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, We never used to see them in the winter time," said McLauchlan. "Our local businesses are seeing increased walk-ins and increased traffic."

While McLauchlan stated he would like to see an increase in tourism yearround and felt all seasons needed promotion, he added there was one additional perk to seeing more tourists roll into town in the colder months of the year.

"The good thing about those people in the winter time can't camp, they have to be in lodges, they have to be in hotels, they have to be B and B's (bed and breakfasts), so that's a huge boost for the community."

munity."

In that same vein, there is a push to see increased snowmobiling tourism in the region. With hundreds of kilometres of groomed trails and climate change pushing snow out of the northern United States, many snownobilers from that area are heading north to find a place to ride.

are heading north to find a place to ride.
While that is a good thing for the region, McLauchlan added the community needed to be ready for it.

"We need to be ready for it.

"We need to make community snow-mobile friendly," said McLauchlan, "All frontline people need to know the language.

"Where do we get onto the trails, where's the gas, how can I get things

fixed, where do I go," continued McLauchlan. "People want to come to the north, people want to come and do what we do up here and we should be the ones promoting the good that our community has,"

White an increase in snowmobiling opportunities would be a boon for The Pas and area, it is just one piece of the overall puzzle and touches on the fact that while there is plenty to do in the north, there also isn't as much that's ready-made to go for tourists.

"The issue that we have is we have a lack of products or experiences. When you come to The Pas what do you do? Well, you go to Clearwater Lake. Ok, well then what do you do. We'll go to The Caves. Ok, then what do you do? Where can you rent a boat, where can you rent a paddleboard, who can take you out? If I want to take a tour who will take me out," said McLauchlan. "That's not just The Pas, that's all throughout the north, that's all over the place."

Part of the solution to the problem is engaging entrepreneurs. While some events and activities may not be million dollar ideas they each have the capability to make money while providing tourists with a new event or adventure. Part of the struggle those is convincing those who

have the capacity to fill that gap to take the plunge and do it.
"It seems there's always that one little

"It seems there's always that one little hump that stops people from doing things so my job is to find that hump and smooth it out for them, whether that's permitting, whether that's forms, funding, whatever. But people just need to step forward and take that plunge, so if you got an idea step forward and talk to me," explained

McLauchlan.

Data on how the efforts of Travel Munitoba and McLauchlan are panning out is largely anecdotal and not based on hard numbers -something McLauchlan said is the case across the province currently-there is strong evidence the plan is working based upon feedback generated. It will hopefully continue in the years to

come.
"The whole strategy is to get more people to spend more time and more money and the strategy has worked," said McLauchlan.

"We've had some good successes, we're pretty happy with the way the programs have rolled out our partners are all working well together," he added. "They've been excited about the extra attention that's been placed on them and they're ready to roll up their sleeves and get to work."

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Manitobans will elect next provincial government Sept. 10

Manitobans will be heading to the polls Sept. 10 to elect the province's next government, Progressive Conservative leader Brian Pallister announced June 19.

"Over three years ago, Manitobans overwhelmingly entrusted us with a clear mandate to fix the finances, repair the services, and rebuild the economy, said Pallister, who be-came premier when the PCs ousted the NDP af-ter 17 years in power in the spring of 2016. "We inherited a mess. But together, we have made real progress. The deficit is cut by more than half. Health care and education investments are at a record high. And we did so without raising one single tax on Manitoba families.

Pallister touted the reduction of the provincial sales tax back to seven per cent come July I and said his government has achieved 90 per cent of

what it set out to do. "On Sept. 10, Manitobans will have an opportunity to choose between building a bet-ter Manitoba with lower taxes and better services, or falling back to the higher taxes and worse services we experienced under the NDP", Pallister said. "That's a risk Manitobans can't afford.'

NDP leader Wab Kinew had a different take on how Manitoba

is doing.
"[Pallister] has made
a lot of bad choices," Kinew said in a video posted on Twitter. "He's chosen to cut health care, he's chosen to ignore the meth crisis, he's chosen to pick fights with the mayor [of Winnipeg], the prime minister, you name it, but now you're going to get your opportunity to make a choice and I want you to choose me. I'm going to fix health care. I'm going to stand up for jobs in Manitoba and I'm going to fight for our future, which means protecting the environment.

Manitoba Liberal leader Dougald Lamont told 680 CJOB that choosing to have an election in September instead of October 2020 as set out in Manitoba's fixed election date law demonstrates Pallister's priorities.

"This is an election that's convenient for him," said Lamont, adding that the Liberals will be ready to fight this election and will field a full slate of 57 candidates. "I think it is an incredibly important election. It's a choice between whether Manitobans want to reelect one of the tired old

parties or elect another party, the Manitoba Liberal party, which wants to do things differently and frankly Manitobans don't have to put up with another four years of cuts to education, health care and infrastructure and the incompetence of the

Pallister government Manitoba Metis Fed-eration President David Chartrand said he was concerned that the election date is one day before a court date to resolve the matter of the Manitoba Minnesota Transmission Project and that he didn't believe Pallister's reason for calling an election this year.
"I do not buy the ex-

cuse that this election date has to be rushed as not to conflict with Manitoba's 150th birthday celebrations in 2020," said Chartrand in a press release. "If Pallister cared so much about this province's history, he would sit down with its founding people and live up to the agreements and treaties we have worked so hard to



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

were thrown from the motorcycle.


The 76-year-old female was pronounced deceased on scene

Also on hand at the barbecue last week was Smart's wife Janine and kids Dylan and Kristin.



An acoustic consultant was brought in to make sure each room meets a required standard so everyone can be heard properly without having sound from other rooms blend into each other.

"Some of the other features that make it distinct from our most recent builds, is that it's a 'k' to eight school," Todd Monster, the Superintendent for the GVSD, said. The green spaces and playgrounds will not be in place when school begins.




